- Scheduled to teach CSD 480/580 (co-convened): Multicultural Issues, May, 2019.
 This required course will explore all facets of diversity (race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, socio-economic status, exceptionality, language, religion, etc.) and examine culturally responsive practices within the field of speech/language pathology.
- Taught both online and face-to-face sections of CSD 210: Introduction to Language Development, a required undergraduate course averaging 35 students per semester. This course covers language, literacy, and associated cognitive development from birth through adolescence, domains and components of oral and written language, connections and differences between oral and written language development, prevailing theories of language development, the neurological basis for language and literacy development, risk factors for language and/or literacy difficulties, cultural and socio-economic variable affecting oral and written language development, teaming with educators and families, and public awareness/ advocacy.
- Taught both online and face-to-face sections of CSD 365: Acquired Communication Diorders, a required undergraduate course averaging 35 students per semester. CSD 365 covered the following topics: etiology, symptoms, diagnosis, and treatment of common neurogenic disorders, including traumatic brain injury, aphasia, apraxia, dysarthria resulting from neurological diseases or birth trauma, right hemisphere dysfunction, and dementia. Also covered issues relating to culturally and linguistic diversity and counseling.
- Taught CSD 405: the Clinical Process, a required, face-to-face, undergraduate course
 averaging 30 students per semester. Topics included cultural competence, advocacy,
 legislation pertaining to people with disabilities (IDEA and ADA), accessibility,
 inclusion, collaboration with educators and related service providers, working with
 families and communities, evidence-based practice, professional ethics, models of
 service delivery, record-keeping, and assessment practices.

- Taught CSD 520: Articulation and Phonology. This required graduate course included 30 students in a blended format (20 students were face-to-face, while 10 participated via distance technology). Topics included all aspects of speech sound development, as well as the diagnosis and treatment of speech sound disorders throughout the lifespan.
- Co-taught CSD 396: Autism in our Community, a service-learning designated course for undergraduates, averaging 15 students per semester. Topics included strengths and challenges associated with autism, the disability rights movement, inclusion and accessibility, supporting neurodiversity on campus and in the community, and advocacy.
- Co-taught CSD 595: Evidence-based Practices for Autism, an online graduate course averaging 25 students per semester. Topics included strengths and challenges associated with autism, assessment and treatment practices, collaboration with families and educators, inclusion, special education law, positive behavior supports, and advocacy.
- Taught "This is your Life: Crafting your Memories into Memoir, Poetry, and Fiction", a non-credit continuing education course offered through the MOLLI program at the University of Montana. In this class, senior citizens used their own personal narratives as material for drafting short stories, novels, poetry, and memoirs, participated in weekly writing workshops, and published an anthology of their work.
- Taught ENCR 210: Introduction to Creative Writing (Fiction). This entry level course offered an exploratory glimpse into the world of literary fiction. Students honed their own creative writing skills in response to daily prompts and participated in writing workshops where they gave and received feedback on their manuscripts in progress.

OTHER RELEVANT PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

Below is a summary of my career highlights from the years 1998-2014, during which time I worked for the Missoula Area Education Cooperative, the Child Development Center, and the Missoula Writing Collaborative.

Co-Teach Preschool, The University of Montana (1998-2014, P/T)

Speech/language Specialist/ Literacy Consultant/ Autism Consultant. Provided instruction and interventions for language, literacy, and social communication skills within whole-class and small group settings within this inclusive preschool environment. Helped teachers develop and implement early literacy curriculum targeting phonological awareness, print awareness, and alphabet knowledge. Also consulted with parents and teachers re: the cultivation of a language-rich and print-rich environment and the selection of quality, inclusive children's literature. Assisted with the Montana Early Literacy Project (providing thematic, language-rich, literature based materials for Montana classrooms), supervised numerous undergraduate and graduate student practicum students, provided trainings to numerous school districts on positive behavioral supports and best practices for children with autism, and helped teachers adapt and modify classroom expectations to ensure full inclusion of students with disabilities.

Flathead Indian Reservation, Montana (1998-2005, P/T)

Speech/language Specialist/ Literacy Consultant. Provided assessment and treatment services related to all aspects of communication and literacy at four separate school districts (Arlee, Charlo, Dixon, and St. Ignatius) as well as two tribally-run HeadStart programs. Participated on school-wide literacy task force at St. Ignatius. Helped to plan and implement a new school-wide literacy program in St. Ignatius Elementary, after that school received a multimillion dollar literacy grant from the federal government. Provided consultation and training for HeadStart staff and families on all aspects of early literacy.

Child Development Center (CDC), Missoula, Montana (2006-2015, P/T)

Speech/language Specialist/ Member of Multidisciplinary Diagnostic Team. Provided home-based early intervention services targeting all aspects of communication and emerging literacy for children ages zero to three. Served as member of multidisciplinary team using the Autism Diagnostic Observation Scales to determine whether or not children met the educational disability criteria for autism in this state. Also provided assessments for all other

areas of speech, language and emergent literacy, both within the CDC clinic and within families' homes.

Missoula Writing Collaborative "Writers in the Schools" Program (2013-present, P/T) Provided whole-class and small group creative writing instruction for third, fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students in the following schools: Lowell Elementary, Sussex School, Florence-Carlton School, and Chief Charlo Elementary. Helped each school stage a public reading of student work and publish an anthology of student poems and stories. Also taught creative writing to school-aged children within MWC's summer camp programs.
